

Extreme Risk Firearm Protection Order Changes House Bill 12

Sponsors: Representatives Garratt and Chandler, Senators Duhigg and Berghmans

OVERVIEW

House Bill 12 amends the Extreme Risk Firearm Protection Order (ERPO) Act in two key ways:

- 1. It clarifies who can act as a reporting party to initiate the petition process. The current law contains ambiguity, and this bill explicitly grants police officers the authority to file a petition.
- 2. The bill addresses the 48-hour period currently allowed for an individual to relinquish their firearm, after receiving an order. This waiting period can be counterproductive and pose unnecessary risks. By closing this gap, the bill ensures a faster and more effective response to mitigate potential danger.


