Criminal Competency & Treatment House Bill 4 Sponsors: Senators Brantley, Cervantes, Representatives Chandler, Anaya and Reeb

OVERVIEW

House Bill 4 significantly rewrites sections of the Criminal Code related to criminal competency, establishing a detailed flowchart outlining the court's actions regarding determination, commitment, and treatment. The bill also broadens the range of crimes for which a defendant may be criminally committed.

DESIRED RESULTS

- Reduce the crime
- Restore competency
- Provide individuals with a second chance at life, once they are held accountable
- · Recognize that most individuals won't seek treatment on their own, so intervention is necessary

WHY NOW?

- More than 18,000 criminal cases in New Mexico have been dismissed on competency grounds since 2017
- This has resulted in at least 1,500 repeat offenders
